Francesca was introduced to the Rural Youth Project by the team at MDS. She would love to see everyone from the hack again in the future to find out what they have done.



Background

Francesca Pritchard recently graduated from the University of Exeter with an undergraduate degree in liberal arts and is currently taking part in a Management Development Services (MDS) graduate scheme. Her first placement is with Coregeo, who manage the licensing of fruit and vegetable products such as Pink Lady apples and Tenderstem broccoli.

The team at MDS introduced Francesca to the Rural Youth Project and the opportunity to take part in the Ideas Hack. Francesca applied as she felt it was a good opportunity to meet other young people in the fresh and food sector. Francesca feels she gained a lot from the hack including more confidence in her role.

"I called my Mum at the end of the weekend and told her how glad I was that my weekend was spent at the hack. I left feeling like I could hold a conversation with anyone and went to work feeling like I knew what I was doing and that I was supposed to be there."

Like many of the young people at the hack, Francesca had mainly heard about the sector in a very traditional sense, that the main roles were fruit picking, and all the roles were labour intensive, she was however intrigued by what the sector had to offer.

"Now I know that there is actually a lot of opportunities out there. I think that they need to be publicised more to show that there is more than one route. There are so many different opportunities and a really diverse range of roles available."

In terms of encouraging more people to join the industry Francesca thinks graduate schemes are the key, similar to the path she has chosen.

"I may be biased, but offering graduate schemes and promoting a range of skill sets and knowledge transfer as well as making sure universities promote the sector and all that it has to offer is so important in attracting young people."


